


Latvian folk dances fall in two main groups. The first group embraces the few remaining ritualistic dances that portray the important events in mans life, or the seasons of na ture. The second group, the more popular one, stresses the joy of pure movement, unhindered by symbolism. About one third of these dances are for couples who usually form a sin gle circle. Group dances include up to sixteen couples. The dominant for mation is a group of four or eight couples - the square. Most figures are a variation of the circle, with hands joined. Reeling is added for more elaborate and difficult patterns. Young people of Latvian origin are attracted to the various dance groups in increasing numbers. Latvian folk dance exerts a strong binding force on the young ...

LATVIA

Latvia, one of the three Baltic States, is situated on the Eastern shores of the Baltic Sea. Latvia is on the same latitude as James Bay but its climate is similar to that of Southern Ontario. RIGA, Latvias capital, was founded in I20I.

Latvia, because of its strategic location, has been repeatedly overrun by its big neighbours. For over 7 centuries it was dominated in turn by Vikings, German Teutonic knights, Swedes, Poles and Russians. Latvians, who had settled there about 4000 years ago, however, retained their national identity, language and culture. Latvians belong to the Baltic branch of the Indo/European family.

Hundreds of years of foreign domination ended in 1918, when Latvia became independent, after a long and bitter war of liberation against the former occu pants the Germans and the Russians. The 2 million Latvians lost their independence 20 short years later in 1940. as a result of secret German-Russian deal of 1939. USSR annexed Latvia in 1940. Nazi Germany invaded Latvia during WW II. Soviet Union returned in 1945. Latvia today is virtually a province of the USSR. As a direct result of Soviet deportations, population exchanges. genocide and banishment to Siberia, native Latvians have been reduced to less than 54% of total population. This planned policy is to continue. Latvians have been denied the basic human rights: freedom of movement, speech, assembly and worship in their own native country! Western countries, including Canada, do not recognize Soviet occupation of Latvia.





Songs

Folksongs form one of the richest treasures of Latvian heritage, tracing the life and times of Latvians through the centuries. Folksongs keep Latvians together in the free world. Folksongs are sung in protest in Soviet occupied Latvia ... The majority of Latvian folk songs originated in the I3th & I6th centuries. The first recorded song dates back to I632. The meter and style of some suggest even earlier origins. At the turn of the 20th century 60,000 original songs had been co llected with approximately 775.000 noted variations and texts... Latvian folk songs "DAINAS" are lyrical and full of sympathy for fellow humans - women having been the principal creators. The surviving lyrical, four line verses created by the people reflect the often subdued nations life through the ages. Latvian folk songs cover birth, childhood, love, marriage, and finally death. Almost half of the compiled songs are devoted to courting and marriage. Other popular topics are the changing seasons, holidays and festivities. Specially brilliant are the songs celebrating the ancient mid-summers festival John's Day (24th June). Many songs deal with daily life in the fields, pastures and around the home. A recurring theme in others - compassion for people subjugated by cruel masters ... Another popular theme - ancient religious life and beliefs concerning life after death.

Dances

Folk dances form an important part of Latvian cultural heritage. Though not as temperamental and spectacular as other national dances, they reflect the Northern character rather well. The dignity and relative slow ness of the Latvian dances does not deprive them of their cheerfulness and playfulness. The small and light dance steps are much admired by the youthful dancers of Latvian origin, even in this day of fast beat and rythm...

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
