JULIE NIXON EISENHOWER

The youngest daughter of the President, 25-year old Julie Nixon Eisenhower was born July 5, 1948, in Washington, D.C., during her father's first term as Congressman from California's 12th District. She united two Presidential families on December 22, 1968, when she married Dwight David Eisenhower II, only grandson of the late President Eisenhower.

Julie's schooling followed her father's political career, alternating between the East and West Coast. She entered public grade school at Horace Mann Elementary School in Washington, D.C. She spent three years there and three years at the Sidwell Friends School in Washington. In 1961, Julie entered the Marlboro School for Girls in Los Angeles, and finished high school at the Chapin School in New York, while her father was an attorney there.

She was graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Smith College in Northampton, Mass., in 1970. She received a Master of Arts in Education from Catholic University in Washington, D.C., in December, 1971, becoming the first daughter of a President to earn a higher degree while her father was in office.

Julie has had an active part in her father's Administration, speaking extensively across the country on behalf of the Nixon Administration and its programs. Since her father took office, she has spoken in 40 states (150 appearances in the past year alone). She and David were the official United States representatives to the Japan World Exposition in Osaka in 1970.

Julie's special interests include her work in areas involving health and the handicapped, in education and in the environment. She has made some 50 appearances to further interest in health and the handicapped and about 25 appearances on behalf of environmental concerns. She originated and continues to give special tours of the White House for groups of blind children and adults.

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
